Planning for Zilker's Future

A small group of your neighbors has set themselves the task of preparing the neighborhood for the City of Austin's neighborhood planning process. This volunteer group, informally known as the Greater Zilker Committee, has been meeting since August, chewing the fat over the neighborhood's future.

According to the City of Austin's website on neighborhood planning, "Neighborhood plans provide a process for concerned people to work together to improve their communities. Neighborhood planning involves people who live, work, own property, or own businesses in the neighborhood, and includes the major institutions in the neighborhood such as churches and schools. The results of individual neighborhood plans will become a permanent part of the City's planning and development process."

The impetus began in July when members of the city planning staff presented interested neighbors a schedule that would bring Zilker into the city's neighborhood planning process in Fall 2004. Shortly thereafter, the executive committee asked Robin Cravey to organize a committee to begin preparations for that project. With a year of lead time, the committee should be able to lay some extensive groundwork.

The committee has held two productive meetings. Members have clarified the goals and vision for the committee and pulled together a lot of necessary background data on the neighborhood. Even a group of less than a dozen has a broad variety of viewpoints on how the neighborhood should plan and what it should plan for.

The group is divided into four subcommittees: recruiting and outreach; research and information; drafting and organization; and process and procedure. Substantial work will be done in the subcommittees.

The committee has also established a group page at Yahoo! Groups under the name ZNPC 2003 where the public can read our messages and peruse our files.

Since our July meeting I've heard from numerous folks willing to commit funds for the curb and gutter construction fund, and a business owner willing to hold a fund raiser. We put money collection on hold to do more research, seeking assurance that if we contribute half of

the money for curb and gutter construction, the sidewalk in front of the Lost Canyon condos actually would be built. I have more information and think the situation is looking very promising, but cannot be more specific at press time for this newsletter. If you are interested in this sidewalk, please come to the October meeting for an update and to participate in any necessary discussion.

LOOKING BACK, AND AHEAD

I've enjoyed my term as ZNA President. On behalf of Zilker residents, I want to express appreciation for the other members of the Executive Committee, several of whom devote many hours each month to serving the interests of the 'hood. I've had the perfect vantage point to see how much we all benefit from their efforts. Thank you, EC members!

In conversations over the past year I've learned a bit of history about conflicts between Zilker folks regarding various projects. Also, several people have told me about a negative experience they had with ZNA officers, or a perception that the neighborhood association "does not represent my point of view" on some issue—often as an explanation for why the person does not participate in the ZNA now. Before I give up the privilege of the president's column, I want to share two thoughts in response.

First, it's no more likely that all Zilker residents will agree on the best choice in a given situation, than it is that all the residents of a small town would agree. There are over 3,000 households plus many businesses and a variety of institutions within the ZNA boundaries. One of the significant features of our neighborhood is the fact that residents span a wide range of ages, occupations, education and income levels, and length of time in the 'hood. Apparently we have a relatively high proportion of independent, thoughtful, active, and strong-willed people here, and we often have

Zilker's New Principal: Brenda McCullar

Brenda McCullar was recently appointed the new principal of Zilker Elementary School. The classroom is where she has spent much of her career and she feels that the classroom experience should remain the focus of the school. "I love the classroom and I miss teaching," she said. "But my philosophy is that if I ever stopped missing the classroom, then I would have no business being the principal."

It is this enthusiasm for teachers and teaching that helped McCullar win a battle to keep a class recently. When Zilker was in danger of losing a sixth grade, Principal McCullar teamed up with the PTA to convince the AISD board to retain the class and the teacher.

"We all need each other," McCullar said.

"The teachers, the parents, and the community need a very strong bond."

Hosting events like the Zilker Neighborhood Association's July's Watermelon Social on the school grounds is a great way to build those bonds," said McCullar. "It was great to have the neighborhood come into the school; after all, the school really belongs to the neighborhood."


McCullar would like to be more active with the neighborhood in the future. "The school is an anchor in the neighborhood, and having more events here would be wonderful," she remarked.


The principal received her undergraduate and master's degrees from Stephen F. Austin State University in Nacogdoches and her administrative certification from the University of St. Thomas, Region IV.

When asked about concerns facing the school, McCullar said her top priorities are making sure that every child succeeds to the best of their ability and providing a safe place for learning. "We have strong staff, heavy parental involvement, and a community that cares. That can't be beat for helping our children succeed," said McCullar.

In addition to her concerns about success

and safety, the school faces two sets of standards to meet: the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) test and the new federally mandated No Child Left Behind (NCLB). These requirements don't seem to daunt McCullar, however. "We are an exemplary school," she said. "We will do whatever is needed to maintain that standing."

Envisioning Central Texas' Future

How would a million more people living in central Texas impact the Zilker Neighborhood?

Envision Central Texas (ECT) is a nonprofit organization developing a growth management vision for Travis, Hays, Williamson, Caldwell, and Bastrop counties. While ECT's process has no regulatory authority, its recommendations will be important when local jurisdictions, such as the City of Austin, make policy decisions, including those that will affect our neighborhood.

The next step for ECT is asking central Texas citizens their preferences on how our region should grow. During the week of October 6th, ECT distributed through local newspapers an information pamphlet and survey; copies have also been distributed along with this newsletter. Your survey responses are important because they will help shape the final growth management vision prepared by ECT.

The ECT survey asks respondents to choose from one of four growth scenarios, and also asks for the community's preferences on such things as transportation systems, types of housing, and new job placement. I would like to call your attention to five survey questions in particular that directly relate to our neighborhood and how it would be impacted by doubling of the population over the next 20 to 40 years: #1, 7, 8, 13, and 16.

Question #1 indicates where the new population growth would go. Scenario A (continuing to grow as we have for the past ten years) would have the least impact on current neighborhood land use and character with only about one square mile of existing developed land redeveloped with higher densities. At the other extreme, Scenario D (directing almost all growth into areas already developed) would have the most existing developed land redeveloped with 16 sq. miles redeveloped with much higher densities. Scenarios B and C fall inbetween.

If none of the proposed scenarios seems to work or present a pattern of growth that is acceptable, you can indicate to ECT that they need to develop a different approach by checking the last box, "I do not like any of these scenarios," on Question #7. Question #8 is the only one that allows citizens to express their opinion on whether or not the amount of population growth ECT projects in central Texas would be good for our quality of life.

As we have seen over the last few years, Austin has become the most expensive large city in Texas. Question #13 allows the community to let our planners know that this is a serious issue when addressing growth management. If you like the character of Zilker and other close-in older neighborhoods, then Question #16 allows you to tell the planners to respect our neighborhood. This is especially important as we develop our Zilker neighborhood plan and for validation of all the other neighborhood plans that have been completed in Austin.

Zilker Park Fun Facts...

Austin's long-term love affair with Barton Springs probably began with the area's first settlers—Native Americans who were attracted to the natural springs.

In 1917 Barton Springs became city property when A.J. Zilker offered 50 acres to the City of Austin in exchange for the City paying the Austin School District \$10,000 per year for 10 years, to benefit children. A similar transaction in 1931 added another 250 acres; Zilker's final donation of 25 acres was made shortly before his death in 1934.

Although Barton Springs has been a recreational area longer, many early 20th-century Austinites thought Deep Eddy was more accessible. One could take the street car to Deep Eddy, but Barton Springs was "way out in the country."

A.J. Zilker came to Austin as a young man in 1876 with 50 cents in his pocket. He began earning money in Austin by washing dishes in

local restaurants. Soon he landed work in an ice factory on the river for \$1.25 a day, and within three months he was leasing the plant himself. His ice business spread throughout Texas, and he became one of Austin's earliest millionaires.



Spanish explorers wrote in 1714 that wild horses were numerous at Barton Springs.

Clare Ogden Davis, newspaperwoman and author, born in 1892, was perhaps the first woman to cover police assignments in Texas and worked as Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson's press secretary. She also adds helping found the garden center in Zilker Park in Austin to her lengthy list of accomplishments.

Barton Springs is the fourth largest spring in Texas.

Isamu Taniguchi, a Japanese man from California later sent to a federal internment camp in Texas during WWII, built the Japanese Garden in Zilker Park.

Mentor and Make A Difference

Some things just shouldn't happen. For example, no kid should be on a waiting list for a mentor. No student should have to wait to find someone to help him study. No child should have to wonder if there will be someone to listen to her read.

But that is exactly what is happening at Zilker Elementary School. Several students are waiting for mentors to help them with their school work, listen to their problems and guide them down a positive path.

If you ever wanted to make a difference in a child's life, here is your opportunity. Zilker Elementary is inviting all caring adults to be mentors for students ages 4 to 12.

Is it hard to be a mentor? Not at all. First, and foremost, you need to be a caring friend, a good listener, and a positive role model to your mentoring child. Here are some other things you need to know before you sign up:

- 1) All mentor visits are to be conducted on school grounds during school hours.
- 2) Agree to visit with your assigned child at Zilker for the remainder of the 2003-04 school
- 3) Commit to meet the student for 30 minutes to one hour once a week at Zilker.
- 4) Most mentors visit during the lunch period.
- 5) Agree to a background check conducted by the Department of Public Safety.
- 6) Attend a one-hour mentor training session at Zilker, or another nearby location.

For our children and our neighborhood, please consider becoming a mentor. It could be the best thing you ever did. For more information about the program, contact the Zilker counselor Vicki Samuelson at (512) 414-3319.
