The producers of the festival, Capital Sports & Entertainment (CSE), and the City of Austin Parks and Recreation Department (PARD) will have representatives at a table set up at our ZNA Watermelon Social on July 26th (see meeting announcement this page). On April 20th, CSE hosted a meeting with PARD staff to update Zilker. Barton Hills. Bouldin, and Rollingwood representatives on plans and preparation for the 2004 ACL Music Festival. Information we received from the CSE team members indicates that preparations are going well, and I believe they continue to pay appropriate attention to areas of particular interest to the surrounding neighborhoods (e.g., transportation and parking, sound control, care for the park grounds). President's Message

Watermelon Social Recalls the Good Old Days!

Our annual Watermelon Social this month will bring neighbors together for an evening of fun. It's an evening that recalls the heat and grace of the south. We've largely


abandoned the heat—and the

grace-for the comfort of air conditioning. But for one night, we'll brave the heat and relive the grace.

The Social will be Monday night, July 26, at 6:30 pm, in the back yard of Zilker Elementary. Bring your kids. Besides lots of watermelon, there'll be fun and games. We'll keep association business to a minimum.

The watermelon social was one of the south's great defenses

against summer heat. Back before homes were air condi-



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tioned, getting together to cut up some watermelon could make any day a celebration! We did it often during the summer, and it helped make the summer bearable.

Watermelon is the quintessential outdoor fruit, eaten in great red wedges and half rounds bursting with crisp juicy succulence. For a kid, the sticky, overflowing sweetness of watermelon was a total body experience that usually ended up in a dance under the hose. For the grownups, it was a very affordable revel in the bounty of the earth.

Air conditioning changed all that. Gradually we've abandoned our front porches and turned our back on the outdoors, preferring to remain sealed inside the controlled environments of our air conditioned houses. There we remain oblivious to the heat, to the songs of birds, and to the passing of our neighbor in the street. Besides, now our neighbor in the street is passing not on foot but in an airconditioned car. And now we daintily eat watermelon in thin slices to avoid dripping on the floor.

Air conditioning has been a foundation technology for the growth of the south. It allowed the migration of all those too-polite-to-perspire yankees to the steamy bottomlands. It has also been a foundation technology for many of the modern inventions that require controlled environments for their development and production.

On a broad scale, my generation is the last to remember the south without air conditioning in the home. On a family level, Jane and I gave that gift of knowledge to our kids. We refused to buy air conditioning for our home for over two decades, until a recent summer when the mercury topped 100 for a dozen or more days.

It's a positive feedback loop. The energy burned in cooling all our homes and offices and cars and shopping malls is heating up the atmosphere of our cities, and indeed of the planet. That makes it harder for people to bear the natural outdoor climate. So more people need air conditioning.

Even setting aside global warming, which is a pretty big cost, the price of air conditioning has been high. It has fueled the growth of the oil and coal industries, which have wreaked havoc social, political, and environmental across the globe. From the oil-soaked shorebirds of Alaska, to the farmers with poisoned wells, to the dispossessed peasants of distant lands, to the soldiers on the outposts of empire, many pay the price for our air conditioning.

But the watermelon social will not be a night for ruing the costs of air conditioning. No. It will be a night for celebrating this great fruit, this great tradition, and this great neighborhood. For one night, we'll relive the heat and the grace. See you there!

Parking rules? What parking rules?

I'm thinking of this as a neighborhood "public service announcement." A primary purpose of efforts to control event-related parking in the neighborhood is public safety, including the need to allow emergency vehicles to travel freely. Because we have extra Police presence, and thus higher frequency of enforcement of parking laws, during high volume events in the nearby parks, here's a refresher from state code (courtesy of my fellow ZNA Executive Committee member, Bobby Rigney).

SUBCHAPTER G. STOPPING STANDING, AND PARKING - Sec. 545.302

An operator may not stop, stand, or park a vehicle:

on a sidewalk;

in an intersection;

on a crosswalk:

alongside or opposite a street excavation if obstructing traffic in front of a public or private driveway;

within 15 feet of a fire hydrant;

within 20 feet of a crosswalk at an intersection;

within 30 feet on the approach side to a flashing light, stop sign, yield sign, or traffic control signal located at the side of a roadway;

within 20 feet of the driveway entrance to a fire station and on the side of the street opposite the entrance to a fire station within 75 feet of the entrance.

It's been a long time since my Driver's Education classes, and I had forgotten how much distance we are supposed to allow from stop signs and

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

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
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

The Membership Committee has 3-4 members thus the various and typical duties associated with membership (meeting. sign-in/welcome letters/dues) are shared by the Committee members, with the Committee meeting on an as-needed basis.

*2nd Vice President—Deborah Bice-Boussard

The ZNA Bylaws say. "The Second Vice President shall fulfill the duties of the President in the President's absence and shall cochair the membership committee." The 2nd VP generally is free to work on whatever special projects most interest her or him.

Secretary—Steve Barnick

Z-News Ad Coordinator—Fontaine Mayerick


The advertising coordinator solicits advertising from local/ neighborhood businesses and responds to queries, keeps records of continued page 6

- Give updates at monthly Executive Committee meetings
- Present pertinent information to General members at quarterly meetings

- Write letters of support / opposition to City regarding zoning issues
- Attend & occasionally present at Zoning or Board of Adjustment hearings
- Be an active member of the Neighborhood Planning Subcommittee

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
